When I began my tenure as Executive Director at CDI in 2016. our team focused on deepening our college and career services, increasing the participation of at-risk males, expanding alternative vocational and educational pathways for graduating students and building leadership and agency in all of the young people we serve. Since that time we have trained nearly 200 young people in Medical Assisting and Coding & Billing and most recently as Emergency Medical Technicians at the CDI Career Academy.

At the high school level we have created two fulltime staff positions dedicated to helping students with career development and job placement, trained staff to help promote self-agency and created the Men's and Women's Leadership groups. Most importantly we have worked in partnership with young people and empowered them by ensuring that they have information, options and access to making educated choices about their future.

One great advantage in my job is that I spend every day with youth who are ever hopeful, imaginative and optimistic about the future. That energy, if cultivated properly, can ignite an industry, a cause or a movement. Now, more than ever, we need to ensure that our young people have the tools and resources to be successful-not just in college and the workforce, but as citizens. In this issue you will have a chance to read about our incredible students, dedicated staff and active community who reflect CDI's core values. We can't do it alone—thank you and all of our supporters for providing the much needed resources to ensure that our students' futures can be so much greater than their pasts.

Omar Campos begins a new chapter in his life

## "CDI helped me discover the kind of role model I want to be for my son."

In his first year at Manhattan Comprehensive Night & Day High School, Omar Campos spent more time hanging out in front of the building than in class. "I came from another high school where no one cared if I was there or not, but CDI staff noticed. My counselor Ms. Gladys took the time to really talk to me. She encouraged me and saw potential in me when I didn't see it in myself. I got myself together and graduated in 2012." Omar went on to LaGuardia Community College, but wasn't sure it was for him. "I had a hard time staying focused in class and I was struggling with the finances. Plus, that was when I became a single parent. I didn't know what to do next so I went back to CDI and met with some of the career counselors to figure out my options."

"Omar is like of so many of our students who are unsure of what to do after high school and have to maintain a balance between their life obligations and education," Hattie Hill, CDI Director of Postsecondary Services at MCNDHS said. "After he left college, he came back to us and we helped to connect him to a restaurant job. He returned, this time looking for advancement. We suggested the CDI Career Academy."

Omar first tried the Academy's Medical Assistant program. 
"I was interested in healthcare but that program wasn't really for me—I was one of the only guys in the course and I wanted something more exciting," he said. At the same time though, something inside of him yearned for more. 
"I didn't want to be like the guys in my neighborhood who'd been sitting on the same corner for years and I saw how

that could happen." In 2017, it finally clicked for Omar when CDI reached out about a new EMT training program at the Career Academy, created in partnership with Borough of Manhattan Community College and Northwell Health. "When I heard 'EMT', I immediately got excited and I knew that was my second chance."

Omar spent the first half of 2018 in rigorous training. "The ambulance rotations were intense!" At the same time he was balancing work and raising his son, now five.

"Having the individualized support of both his counselors and instructors was hugely important," Sandra Morales, Director at the CDI Career Academy said. "Our counselors helped him manage his life issues, and the BMCC and Northwell teachers were male leaders who motivated and mentored him." Frank Nuqui, one of Omar's EMT instructors at BMCC, was at the testing center on the day of Omar's state exam and didn't leave until every member of the cohort finished.

Omar says that having that kind of support from every corner was key to him completing the program. His hard work paid off. He passed his state exam and became a certified EMT. Omar began his new job with Northwell in September. "CDI helped me discover the kind of person that I want to be. They never lost sight of me, even when I felt lost myself. They showed me the kind of role model I want to be for my son. I want to be there for him and be that support like CDI was for me."

## **Learning to Lead**

In 2015, CDI began the Young Men's and Women's Leadership Groups to promote service learning, peer leadership and self-agency in our students. "These groups provide a place to speak candidly about things like healthy relationships, challenges at school, career aspirations and other topics," says Fatimah Shalash, CDI Site Coordinator at The High School for Health Professions and Human Services. "Students leave as leaders and with a greater sense of their place in the world, both as individuals and as part of a community."

The year culminates in a group-led service project. Last year, the men's group hosted an all school games tournament. To take part, students donated gift baskets of toiletries and letters of encouragement to children in local shelters. "It was a lot to organize," said Paul Thompson, senior at HPHS. "We had to plan everything from the food to collecting the donations. I'm excited for next year's event when I get to be the one who works with the younger guys in the group and show them how to get it done."

# **Building a Bridge to College**

CDI alumni are helping graduating seniors make the transition into college with the College Bridge for All program. Camillo Noesi graduated from City-As-School in 2016 and now attends Brooklyn College. He returned to the CDI College & Career Office at CAS to work as a College Coach this past summer, "It's easy to lose focus on everything you need to do between graduation and the first day on campus. I know from experience that it helps to have someone who's been through it to show you the ropes. I explained what the bursar's office is, how to save money on meals and all the other tips I wish I'd know when I started."

College Bridge for All is a partnership between CUNY and the NYC Department of Education designed to aid students in the transition from high school to college. "Despite all the good work students do with us during the year to apply to college, the 'summer melt'—3 months off without any structure—can throw them off track and delay enrollment. College coaches like Camillo help us make sure that students follow through on taking the next big step," CDI CAS Site Coordinator Carolina Moquete said.

Manhattan Comprehensive Night & Day High School opened its doors in 1989 as one of the first transfer schools in New York City. The school began working with high risk students who were in danger of dropping out and generally not thought to be "college material." Teachers, CDI staff and volunteers saw things differently, and made college preparation services a key component of CDI's mission to help students prepare for life after high school. Since then, thousands of our young people have gone on to two and four year colleges.


In 2012 when CDI expanded to The High School for Health Professions and Human Services and City-As-School High School we continued to follow that same model. College advisors work with students every step of the way, including identifying the difference between public and private institutions, helping them to make the best

college choice, apply for scholarships and more. "We counsel students and parents around all aspects of financial aid, including a financial literacy component so that they make fully informed decisions," Patience Yeboah, CDI College Coordinator at MCNDHS said. "Taking on loans is simply not a viable option for many students."

CDI's goal is for college-bound students to apply, enroll and succeed in college. According to data from the National Student Clearinghouse that compares college enrollment and persistence nationwide, students from CDI schools enroll in and complete college at significantly higher rates than similar populations from comparable high schools.

While we continue to expand options for life after high school, college preparation remains a cornerstone of what we do. With your support, we can continue to send more young people to college!
